Message from the Board of Education

"For the most important thing I have learned is that schools reflect the attitudes, beliefs and health of the communities they serve, and therefore, to improve public education means more than changing our schools, it means changing America."

The statement above was made by Jamie Vollmer, a successful businessman who explored the issues of education and quality improvement. He found that public education was a unique operation, one that could not be run like a business. Schools, he discovered, are unable to control the quality of their raw material and are dependent upon unpredictable funding sources. Educators, he deduced, cannot solve these complicated issues alone; changes can occur only with the understanding, trust, permission and active support of the surrounding community. Student Spotlight: Constitution Day

The Long Range Plan

The Long Range Plan for the school district intends to improve the school buildings. There are a number of projects in progress.

PLAINVILLE HIGH SCHOOL

Over the summer most of the construction was completed on Phases 2, 3, and 4. All of the windows were replaced in the older sections of the high school, a new 20,000 gallon oil tank was installed, and most of the site work at the front of the school was completed. The pool renovation process uncovered more problem areas than expected this summer and returning students were a little disappointed to learn that the pool was not ready for swimming in early September. The pool should be fully operational in October and swimmers will find the outstanding results were worth the wait. New electrical distribution and circuit breaker panels were installed just prior to the beginning of school in addition to new hook ups for natural gas. Phase 5 is now under way and this is primarily work in the Kegel Gym and locker rooms along with classrooms numbered in the 200's at the western end of the building. Some of the new hallway flooring has also been installed. Site work in the rear of the building is scheduled to be completed at a later date.

LINDEN STREET SCHOOL

The last major outstanding piece of the Linden renovation was recently completed. Over the summer the fiber optic

computer network connection linking Linden to the High School network was installed, tested and accepted as complete by our network administrator and the Town Manager. This fiber optic link provides high speed data transmission capacity for improved computing speed so that students and staff will not experience delays during high computer use periods.

TOFFOLON SCHOOL

In June, Plainville voters passed the referendum for the additional funding of the Toffolon School renovation. The architect has finalized most of the project plans and specifications, and they have been forwarded to the State for approval. Bids will be sent out and approved in the coming weeks with construction expected to get under way shortly after the bids are received, tabulated and awarded. The renovated school will be completely handicapped accessible, improved for energy efficiency, equipped with upgraded plumbing, mechanical and electrical systems and brought up to fire and building code requirements. In addition, there will be new library, art and music rooms. The Toffolon students, staff and parents are looking forward to the day when the renovated school is ready for their return.

Budget News

The new 2007-2008 budget year began on July 1st and the final school expenditure reports for the 2006-2007 year have been filed with the State Department of Education. It is now time to begin the process of analyzing current costs, identifying areas in the district that need improvement, and planning to include those improvements in the budget for the 2008-2009 school year. During the next couple months, school staff will start putting together the new budget which will be reviewed with the Board of Education in January. School administrators will seek input from parents and staff to gather information about what is needed in the schools. This information will be used to help the Board and administrators decide what to include in the next district budget request.

Adult Education

Plainville's Office of Adult and Continuing Education is an approved GED test registration center. Eligible individuals must be at least 17 years of age and no longer enrolled in school. Applicants 17 and 18 years of age must submit official documentation that they have withdrawn from day school for at least 6 months OR that their 9th grade class has graduated. An application must be completed, in person, at the Adult Education Office by appointment. All individuals registering to take the GED test are required to show a current, valid, governmental photo ID to the registrar as proof of identity. A \$13.00 registration fee applies to non-veterans, 21 years of age or older. Preparation classes are offered evenings, free of charge, covering the five sections of the test: Writing, Social Studies, Science, Reading and Math. Safety Remains Top Priority

Safety continues to be a top priority for school districts across the nation, and Plainville Community Schools is no exception. The safety and security of students and staff is essential within our educational community. As such, a comprehensive network of measures is in place to support a safe and secure instructional and learning environment in the Plainville school system.

The Plainville Board of Education maintains a policy on Emergencies and Disaster Preparedness, which requires that all employees of the school system are responsible for the promotion of the safety of all students at all times. The policy requires that procedures are maintained for fire, civil defense, and other emergencies, as well as maintenance of the fire alarm system and both regular and emergency exits for all buildings. In addition, the policy maintains that at least one person at each school site hold current first aid and / or CPR certification. To support the policy, faculty and staff members district-wide are provided with information, procedures and resources relative to all aspects of school safety. In addition, under the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), a division of the United States Department of Homeland Security, school district administrators recently participated in a National Incident Management Training introduction course on police and fire emergency services. Plainville administrators, faculty and staff collaborate regularly with the local fire and police departments in the area of safety, including the practice of fire and safety drills and building evacuations.

As communication is a key component of safety and security, Plainville Community Schools will soon launch an automated communication system that will enable school officials to deliver critical information to parents, staff, and the community instantly through a bundled set of communication tools including telephone and internet. The school district will continue to work with local safety officials to maintain this important focus and commitment to providing a safe and secure community of learning.

Teacher of the Year, David Gagnard

Plainville Community Schools has named Plainville High School Technology Education Instructor David Gagnard the 2007-2008 *Teacher of the Year*. Gagnard has served as a Technology Education teacher in Plainville for six years. Under his direction, the communications program has grown to include a video production studio, a video control room, graphics and audio rooms, and an Internet radio station. Gagnard, a Plainville resident, holds both a bachelor of science degree and a master of science degree from Central Connecticut State University (CCSU). He serves as an adjunct professor at Briarwood College and CCSU. In addition, he is a member of the National Honor Roll's Outstanding American Teachers, and serves on the State of Connecticut Technology Education Board.
