Accordion Lessons Prove to Be a Hit with Plainville Elementary School Students

Local musician Peter Peluso and Plainville Board of Education member Foster White are once again hosting an "accordion lesson" after school program for elementary school students in Plainville. The duo launched the accordion lesson program in February 2020, with a group of third grade students at Louis Toffolon Elementary School. The lessons were met with much enthusiasm, but due to the pandemic, the program was "paused" over the past couple of years, until this year when Peter and Foster were able to restart the lessons. The duo once again led lessons with a group of Toffolon third graders this past winter, and also added an after school lesson program for a group of third graders at Frank T. Wheeler Elementary School in March. Participating students are assigned a child sized accordion, provided by Peluso, and are instructed in the correct placement of their hands, beginning to play the instrument during the very first lesson, and advance to playing both notes and chords. The primary focus of the program is to introduce a new musical instrument as well as exposing students to the cultural aspects of accordion music.
