Message from the Board of Education

On December 16th, Plainville High School students participated in a career focused "Learning Adventure Day." Learning Adventure Days are designed to provide unique learning experiences that allow students to exercise the school district's Portrait of the Graduate tenets of being *Communica-tive, Collaborative, Innovative, Mindful and Resilient.* The primary focus of the December Learning Adventure Day was "Career Exploration" and students in all four grades at the high school had a wide variety of opportunities in which to explore an extensive variety of vocational pathways.

In preparation for the December Learning Adventure Day, high school students were invited to complete a survey to share which career pathway they were interested in exploring. From that information, the Learning Adventure Day plan was developed. The first part of the day-long program featured a "Career Gallery" where student groups were able to cycle through the school's gymnasium and meet a wide variety of over 70 career representatives from many local businesses and organizations. After the gallery portion of the morning, students were able to select from a menu of more than 35 options for on-site and off-site career focused learning adventures. Examples ranged from a group of students who toured the WTNH News 8 newsroom and live morning news broadcast in New Haven, to a visit with several local manufacturers, a trip to the state capitol and the opportunity to meet with a federal court judge, a hands-on session at a local advertising agency, an interactive session with representatives from Hartford Healthcare and much, much more. Students also had the option to spend a full day at a job shadow of their choice throughout Connecticut.

The December 16th Learning Adventure Day was another exceptional point of pride for Plainville High School and our entire school district. As a Board, we are grateful for the extraordinary support from the many individuals, businesses and organizations that shared their time and unique career pathway journeys with our high school students that day.

Linden Street School students have been tinkering this year with our new 3D MakerBot printers. Students first create a design using a software program called Tinkercad. Depending on the details in their design, this process can take quite a bit of time. When students are pleased with their design, they export it off to be reviewed by a teacher, and then it is sent to the 3D printer. As easy as those steps sound, students know the process is not always that simple. Fifth grade students Ava Autunno, Alekzander Hixson, Jaxson Niedzwiecki, and Steven Pomerleau reflected on their experiences with 3D designing and printing:

What do you like about 3D designing and printing?

I like how it lets you express your creativity and makes your imagination come to life. (Jaxson)

What is challenging about 3D designing and printing?

Some things that are challenging are you

have to have support down for some designs. If you accidentally forget to add something, like a platform, then you have to move your whole creation to put the platform down. Supports are important because without them your creation could fall easily. (Ava)

Have you ever had a printing design fail? If so, how did you persevere?

I have had a print fail. It broke, so after that happened I tried again. I had to change a few things so it wasn't too fragile. You also have to check if your design is thick enough because if it is too thin it could break, but the most important part is to not give up. (Alek)

What would you like other people to know about 3D designing and printing?

I would like people to know that 3D printing and designing is one of the best ways to express your creativity. You can make almost anything you want from characters to cups. There are so many possibilities with 3D printing and more people should be able to do it. In real world situations, people use 3D printing for many everyday uses. Hospitals can even 3D print prosthetics! 3D printing seems like something just to mess around with, but it's important. (Steven)





Wheeler's New Wolf



Frank T. Wheeler Elementary School's wolf mascot has "come to life" thanks to a unique piece of art created by former Wheeler faculty member, Matthew Guarino. Guarino, a longtime Plainville Community Schools employee, also served as the Middle School of Plainville Principal prior to his retirement in 2021, and currently works as a tutor at Wheeler School. Guarino logged many weekend hours planning for and bringing the new Wheeler wolf sculpture to fruition on site at the elementary school. According to Wheeler Principal, Andrew Batchelder, the wolf "commission" was born from a conversation he had with Guarino earlier this year while walking through the school together. "I pointed out the old, iconic oak tree in the back of Wheeler to Matt one day, and explained that the tree would be cut down due to its age and condition. Several Wheeler parents had suggested something be made from the tree if possible, since it is such an integral part of the Wheeler landscape. I asked Matt, who is also a talented artist, what he thought about possibly carving a wolf sculpture into the stump of the tree once it was cut down, and without hesitation he agreed, saying 'yes, I can do that!' " Guarino explained that in preparation for the project, he had initially asked that the tree be cut to approximately eight feet in height, to ideally be able to complete the carving. Instead, the tree was cut, but the stump measured ten feet in height, so Guarino cut off approximately two additional feet to accommodate the carving project, and was able to also create a "Reading Partner Chair" with the extra tree piece, where students enjoy sitting, hanging out and reading together. After many hours of work and three shades of stain, the Wheeler wolf carving was completed and now sits proudly on the school's grounds.
