

Technology Today



Since the start of school our students have been working hard while utilizing technology. This year all middle school students and high school freshmen are required to take a brief online mini-course titled, "Mac Basics." The course is designed to help

students become more comfortable on Macs and to be more effective computer users overall. Reaction from students and teachers has been very positive.

All high school students have had an introduction to Gmail, their student email system, and Google Apps. students another gives means communicating with teachers, each other, and subject specialists. Google Apps lets students work on word processing, spreadsheets, or presentations from home or school, using Mac or PC systems, provided they have access to the internet. This solves the problem of a student creating a file at home, such as a book report, and then not being able to open the file at school. Both Gmail and Google Apps are free to K-12 education and contain no advertisements. The district's enhanced wireless network has resulted in improved performance for students when working on district laptops for online research. Logins occur more rapidly and connection speeds are quicker, with fewer delays. With these changes students are working and learning faster and more efficiently.

Budget News

On Monday, September 27, 2010 Board of Education Chair Becky Tyrrell, Superintendent Binkowski, and Director of Finance and Operations, Richard Carmelich, appeared before the Town Council to field questions on Fiscal Year (FY) 2009-10 purchase orders, final FY 2009-10 budget figures, and other questions related to the BOE budget. In an effort to provide clear and transparent information to the Town Council, administration provided council members with a copy of the Board of Education's state financial report and a list of all open purchase orders from the prior year. Mr. Carmelich also made the council members aware of the wealth of financial information publicly available each month in the packet prepared for every Board of Education meeting.

In addition to the object budget, monthly Board of Education packets also include a budget summary of energy costs, special education expenditures, and the food services budget. In September, administration provides the Board of Education with a detailed account of the amount budgeted in the prior fiscal year and compares those figures to actual expenditures. As part of the Board packet,

this information is available to the public.

The Board of Education makes the Board approved budget available on the district website every spring, and the final appropriation available on the website once enacted. Hard copies are also available at the public library and in other areas throughout town. During the 2010-11 budget adoption process, the Board of Education administration met with the Town Council and was prepared with responses to over 50 written questions from Town Council members. These questions on the Board of Education's adopted budget were on issues ranging from personnel to administration, and special education. The Board of Education also makes numerous presentations and holds many public meetings over the course of the budget adoption process.

The Board is different than private companies in that the school district is also held accountable through laws pertaining to freedom of information. In the last few years, the Board of Education has responded to a number of Freedom of Information requests by providing information on payroll, benefits, special education expendi-

tures, utility bills and reimbursement expenses. Administration also spends a great deal of time talking to the local media and providing information for reporters who request it.

At the end of every month, the Board of Education makes sure that our financial records balance with the town. Annually, the Board of Education's financial information is audited both by auditors hired by the Town of Plainville and by the Connecticut State Department of Education through a desk audit of the ED001 end of the year state financial report.

Both audits provide a detailed examination of the Board's operating and grant expenditures, grant revenues, special education costs and student demographic information.

From well before the beginning of any fiscal year until well after the year is over, the Board of Education's budget and financial information are reported, audited, tracked and made available through many avenues to Board of Education and Town Council members, citizens of Plainville, the media, and anyone else with interest in the finances of the Plainville Community Schools.
