## **Budget News**

On October 4, Board members Charlotte Koskoff, Barbara Willard. and Patrick Ringrose met to discuss the formation of a Finance Sub-Committee of the Board of Education. Also present were Board Chair Becky Tyrrell, Superintendent Jeff Kitching and Director of Finance and Operations Rich Carmelich. At that meeting, the Board members discussed the roles and responsibilities of such a committee and the topics that would be discussed at regularly held meetings.

The role of the sub-committee was based on the premise that the development of the Plainville Community Schools' budget is a collaborative process between the full Board of Education, the Superintendent, and the administrative staff. It was noted that Connecticut State Statute places responsibility on the Board of Education for approving an annual

budget and for the allocation of the funds ultimately approved by the Town of Plainville for that budget. Therefore, it was decided that this committee would not be charged with responsibilities that overlap that budget development process. Instead, the committee will provide a vehicle for sharing and reviewing information on the status of the school system's current and projected expenditures at specific points in the fiscal year. In addition, the committee will report this information to the full Board and make recommendations when necessarv. This standing sub-committee of the Board will convene three regular meetings each fiscal year, in October, January, and May. Additional meetings of the committee may be held if deemed necessary by the full Board. The purpose of each regular committee meeting will be as follows:

October: Review of previous

fiscal year closeout, including a review of budgeted versus actual expenditures; status update on current year budget, including adjusted expenditure projections for the current fiscal year.

January: Review of projections for the current fiscal year and discussion of potential budget impact, and discussion of potential deficits/realized savings in specific accounts.

**May:** Discussion of realized savings projections and / or projected deficit recommendations to full Board for adjustments.

Membership on the Finance Sub-Committee will include: three (3) Board of Education members; the Board of Education Chair (exofficio); the Superintendent of Schools; and the Director of Finance and Operations.

The Board formally approved the sub-committee formation at its meeting on October 11.

#### PLAINVILLE HIGH SCHOOL

Plainville High School DECA members recently participated in the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation (JDRF) walk at Rentschler Field in East Hartford, to fund juvenile diabetes research efforts, raising approximately \$1,100 for JDRF. 172 Plainville High School students received 200 awards at the first annual Plainville High School Academic Recognition Ceremony held on September 15. Awards were presented for academic excellence, outstanding achievement and special recognition. The PHS School Counseling Department held a college fair on October 21, featuring more than 80 colleges and universities. Plainville residents recently received a brochure in the mail created by the Environmental Club in collaboration with the Plainville Clean Energy Task Force. The high school club has been working closely with the Plainville Clean Energy Task Force to promote awareness of alternative clean energy.

Plainville Community Schools has named Frank T. Wheeler Elementary School fifth grade teacher Jennifer Murrihy 2011-2012 Teacher of the Year. Murrihy has been an educator for eight years, serving as a fifth grade teacher at Wheeler for the past five years. She is the founding faculty advisor of the Wheeler School Green Team, which plans a week long Earth Week celebration, serves as faculty

advisor for the Wheeler School Drama Club, and has participated on a number of school district committees. She has also served as a presenter at the Connecticut Computer Educators Conference, and was awarded a National Endowment for the Humanities grant for professional development. When asked about her philosophy of teaching, Murrihy noted, "Effective teaching has three components: passion for learning, community building, and collaboration. My philosophy is to incorporate these three elements to create an environment where students feel valued, excited and safe to explore what really motivates them to learn."
