Message from the Board of Education

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It's the start of another great school year! A new school year is an exciting time for children, teachers, and parents. It means making new friends, taking part in new activities, learning new skills, and trying new things. So as we start this new year, the Board wants you to know about a few of the initiatives going on around the district:

- Full day Kindergarten in all of the elementary schools
- · A new math program, Envision, in the K-6 grades
- Strategic Planning development of the 5-year plan for the district which includes parents, community members, BOE members, teachers, administrators and municipal representatives
- Student Success Plans MSP and PHS have begun to develop these plans for students in grades 6-12. They are designed to prepare students to be college and career ready by the time they graduate.
- Special Education Program Review the Special Education Department has developed a committee to review the way these services are delivered to our school district.
- Teacher Evaluation the committee met over the last school year to develop a plan for Plainville Community Schools that is in compliance with the new state mandates that go into effect at the start of the 2013-2014 school year.

Safety First

A major concern for all of us at home is safety. We worry about our cars, homes, and recreational equipment. We have smoke detectors, wear seatbelts, never text while driving, and service our vehicles regularly.

Likewise, safety for students is taken very seriously in Plainville schools. During the October Board of

Education meeting, DATTCO Transportation Company did a presentation on its services within and outside of Plainville. Every day in Connecticut, DATTCO transports about 100,000 students to and from school. Here in Plainville, they have done so for the past 55 years. It was interesting to hear the representa-

tives speak so proudly about their company. They employ 120 mechanics to do routine service and safety checks. Each bus is checked daily by the drivers before they begin, and after their route. Should a concern be noted, the bus is checked by the mechanics and serviced.

The State of Connecticut does random safety checks and can 'pull' a bus from service in mid-route if they feel

that it is warranted. Fortunately in Plainville, we have a provider that avoids such a problem by being vigilant and proactive.

DATTCO proudly reports that they not only pass the state inspections, but also do their own 'road patrols' to assure that the operators are driving safely and within

the law. What does that mean for us? Well, for one, the Plainville branch of DATTCO won the 2011-12 DATTCO award for the best safety record in the company. Secondly, it means that we can be assured that our children are in good hands. Plainville Community Schools will continue to consider safety our number one priority

for the years to come and we will continue to work with local safety officials to maintain this focus and commitment. Any member of the Plainville community should contact the school district business office with questions or concerns about safety in the schools.

iPads in Education



At home, some students use and interact with technology everyday--with cell phones, computers and other devices. They use technology to solve problems look up information, and to communicate with friends.

In Plainville Community Schools, we use technology in all areas of learning whenever possible. Some Special Education students are already using iPads to help them communicate with others. Further, an iPad pilot will be launched by an eighth grade math teacher, to help reinforce geometry. In both situations, iPads will help students better use 21st Century Skills.

It is worthwhile to consider the benefits of what a 1 to 1 model can offer, where every student has their own device, changing the way we educate students. Textbooks would be available to students at all times and not just be pictures and words on a page, but contain videos, audio, and 3D animations to help explain the subject matter in a way we have never seen. Teachers can create a file or lessons that students can access immediately with no need for paper copies. Quizzes and tests could be taken digitally with results available instantaneously to the student and the teacher. This would free up time for the teacher to reinforce subject matter. The iPad could also help students with learning difficulties. For example, a student that has trouble reading could have access to the audio version of their textbooks or novels. The iPad is a tool that can help move education forward, expand, and enrich learning.

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Let's Chat With...Edward Hoyt, Director of Business and Operations



What are your primary responsibilities as Director of Business and Operations? Basically, the position covers fiscal management and oversight, facilities operations oversight, and budgetary management.

What attracted you to this position?

Plainville has been noted as a solid school district for as long as I can remember. When I started my career in education many years ago, I was hired at Plainville High School as a teacher for the alternative education program (now special education). When I saw that the position of Director of Business and Operations was open, I jumped at the opportunity to

once again be part of the Plainville Community Schools.

What do you see as your most difficult challenge?

The Board of Education and the Town are seeking to find opportunities to collaborate and consolidate some of their operations. The challenge will be to identify those areas, assure that no services are lost, and that there is gain either financially or operationally all while maintaining morale.

What is your top priority?

Assuring that there are solid 'internal controls.' All funds and operations should have procedures to protect tax-payers' funds and assure that funds are used properly. Everything should be open and transparent.

Describe your leadership style.

My preference is to 'walk about' and participate with staff. I find that by being a partner, I am able to teach staff, learn from staff, and together, accomplish what needs to be done.
