Budget News

The Board of Education approved a 2010-11 budget of \$33,254,942 at its February meeting. This budget represented an increase of \$808,495 or 2.49% over the current fiscal year. The Board also passed a capital budget that included items totaling \$215,000. The Board of Education's budget contained funding sufficient to maintain most existing services and avoid laying off existing staff.

While Plainville High School may not be the largest high school in the state, a look at our list of school sponsored activities shows we are a school that has something for every varying interest. From baseball to business to biology, PHS offers something for everyone! Spring sports are in full swing and promise a season of excitement in the new conference. Baseball, softball, golf, tennis and track teams have been practicing hard and the early news is that they look strong and are hoping to greet the warmer weather with a barrage of wins and successes. For those students not so athletically inclined, PHS boasts incredible academic clubs ranging in topic from business to science. Both DECA and National Ocean Science Bowl (NOSB) teams did an amazing job of representing Plainville in the statewide competitions. PHS supports us not only academically, but helps us grow as individuals by allowing us to experience diverse activities!

On March 1, the Town Manager and Superintendent presented the town and Board of Education budgets to the Town Council. On the town side of the budget, one of the main points made by the town manager was that any tax increases that may result from the final budget would be attributable more to an anticipated decline in revenues than in increased expenditures. Under the Town Manager's budget proposal, 63% of the mill rate increase would be the result of an estimated \$1.98 million in decreased revenue. Town and BOE expenditure changes would only account for 11% and 26% of the proposed mill rate change, respectively.

On March 3, a public hearing was held on the Town Manager's proposed budget. Many who spoke at the public hearing spoke in support of the education budget and cited Plainville's outstanding educational system as a factor in moving to Plainville.

On March 16 and March 23, district administration and Board of Education members appeared before the Town Council to give presentations on several budget related topics and to answer many of the questions the Town Council had furnished the Board of Education in advance of these meetings. On March 16, Maureen Schiffer, Director of Special Education and Pupil Services, and Anne Walsh, Supervisor of Special Education, gave a presentation on special education programs and David Telesca. Assistant Superintendent, spoke about state and federal mandates. Board of Education Chair Becky Tyrrell, Superintendent Binkowski and Richard Carmelich, Director of

Finance and Operations, also gave insights into the Board of Education's budget and answered questions from the Town Council. On March 23, Mr. Telesca gave another presentation on class sizes and staffing levels; Principals Matthew Guarino and Greg Ziogas spoke about additional staffing requests and the athletic budgets at the middle and high schools

respectively; Steve Busel, Director of Facilities, spoke about the facilities budget and Linda VanWagenen, Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment, spoke about student achievement on CMT and CAPT testing.

At these sessions, examples of the questions posed by the Town Council include inquiries about the items included in the professional operating and technical services areas of the district's budget, the grant money received by the district and how those funds are used, and the number of special education and districtwide positions funded

through the BOE budget.

On March 29, the Town Council voted to reduce the Board of Education's budget to \$33,129,942 -- or an increase of 2.1%. This budget set by the Town Council reduced the Board of Education's approved budget by \$125,000. At this level, the Board of Education would likely not have required any layoffs or significant reductions in educational programming from the current year. However, this budget failed at the all day vote that occurred on April 27.

As the budget process continues, the Town Council will continue to make adjustments to the town budget until the budget either passes at the all day vote or becomes enacted after a failed third all day vote. Once the budget is approved, district administration will work to provide the Board of Education with options to address additional reductions to their approved budget.

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Technology Today

The use of technology throughout the Plainville school district is extensive as well as diverse. One area where technology plays a vital role is in data collection, through the use of the Power School system. This system is utilized to collect daily attendance, grades, health information, parent and emergency contact information and much more. Through our vast communication network, we are able to communicate this important student information to parents. Students also use technology in the classroom districtwide. Projects in the schools range from research initiatives, to music and video projects created on the computer. In addition, there are a number of courses that integrate technology including a computerized art class that uses Photoshop to create, edit and produce beautiful works of art. At the middle school, students produce a daily live news video for the school's morning announcements. 
Middle School students also use technology to compete in a Lego League tournament, a robot competition where each team must design, build and program a robot. Students in the Lego League this year came in first place for Innovative Robot Design in the statewide championship competition. In addition, there are classes in engineering and design that teach students how to use AutoCad to create and design a

wide variety of items. Students and staff are also using technology for distance learning. Through the use of technology, they are able to connect to other schools, scientists, authors and other experts--all through the use of video conferencing.

Children today have grown up in a "connected" world and want to learn this way as well. One way teachers infuse this technology based connectivity into learning is through the use of interactive white boards. In the high school, mathematics teachers use this tool to teach and to demonstrate mathematic applications. Social Studies teachers use video and Google Earth to explore various topics with students. Science teachers also use video and animation to demonstrate many concepts in science, while art instructors may show pieces of art work from museums around the world. Elementary teachers also utilize interactive white boards in classroom instruction. In kindergarten, teachers may use the white boards to review the morning calendar, while third grade teachers might conduct a spelling or grammar lesson via the interactive white boards.

Through the use of technology, we are able to extend resources, expand communication, enhance instruction and maximize learning for all students.
