In early March, two Plainville High School students (McKenna Rita and Jacob Masco), Superintendent Kitching, and several board members attended the Connecticut Association of Boards of Education's (CABE) annual "Day on the Hill." This event provides board members, administrators and students the opportunity to speak to their legislators on topics regarding education in Connecticut.

The day began at the Bushnell's Autorino Great Hall with Governor Malloy's remarks concerning this year's proposed budget and other education initiatives. We also heard from Senator Toni Boucher, Senator Beth Bye and Representative Andrew Fleischmann (Education Committee Chairman). Representatives from CABE briefed attendees on issues they will be focusing on during the current legislative session. Everyone then moved to the State Legislative Office Building for either a face-to-face meeting with their legislators or to attend an education breakout session. Our students got to experience, first hand, what it is like to actually

voice their questions and concerns about their school district to the state leaders directly involved in making education decisions. It was a wonderful opportunity for our students to get a glimpse into our state government at work.

WHAT IS FIRST ROBOTICS?

FIRST is a worldwide organization, which is an acronym: For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology. FIRST provides an opportunity to explore Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) which are all important to success in FIRST Robotics challenges. FIRST puts together competitions where teams bring their robots to compete in certain challenges, which vary from year to year.

WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO PREPARE A TEAM FOR A FIRST ROBOTICS COMPETITION?

The team has six weeks to build and program a
robot which needs to be specifically designed to accomplish the task set forth by FIRST.

WHAT QUALITIES MUST A MEMBER OF THE DIGITAL DEVILS TEAM #5129 HAVE AND HOW WILL THOSE SKILLS BE HELPFUL LATER IN LIFE?

The people on a robotics team have to be able to work cooperatively with each other in a team environment. They need to be devoted, willing to give up free time to complete the "bot." Members also have to be good problem solvers, who are able to learn from their mistakes (like when your robot drives in circles when it is supposed to go straight).

WHO CAN JOIN A FIRST ROBOTICS TEAM?

Anyone interested in any of the STEM fields should join.



PLAINVILLE HIGH SCHOOL

Members of the Wheeler student drama group performed scenes from William Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream."
