Q: What is the Extra Innings Program?

A: The Extra Innings Program is an after school program for middle school students. Students participate in a variety of fun and engaging academic and enrichment activities.

Q: What is a typical day like in the program?

A: Students are provided with a nutritious snack and get help with their homework, as well as an opportunity to participate in a variety of classes such as: Trivia Time, Cooking, Sports, Mad Science Experiments and more.

Q: What do you think is best about the Extra Innings Program? A: I really like that the program gives students something fun and constructive to do after school instead of being home alone or engaging in risky behaviors.

Q: How do you choose what classes will be offered in the program?

Budget News

The budget season is now fully underway. The budget calendar is listed on the Plainville Community Schools website and all meetings are open to the public. Meetings will take place throughout January with a Board of Education budget scheduled to be approved at the February Board of Education meeting. The Board meets throughout January to develop the budget through a discussion of budget goals, program priorities, budget impacts and budget solutions. Topics often include contractual salary increases, changes in anticipated benefit and utility costs, the budget for athletics, and special education tuition costs. Throughout March and April, the Board of Education will meet with the Town Council to discuss educational needs and there will be public hearings on the budget for community input. The budget process will culminate with at least one all-day

budget vote at the end of April. As work begins on crafting the 2012-13 budget, there are a number of areas that are being examined that will have an impact on the overall budget increase. First, Plainville will no longer be receiving federal stimulus funds through the Education Jobs Fund. This one-time federal grant allowed the Board to offset approximately \$550,000 in salary and benefit costs in its 2011-12 budget. Because these funds will no longer be available, the Board will need to find an alternative for funding the 7.5 positions and \$168,000 in benefit costs currently paid for through this grant. Second, the district needs to begin implementing its six-year technology replacement cycle. There is a significant portion of the technology inventory that needs to be replaced because it no longer meets the needs of the students. It is expected that the implementation of this replacement cycle will add \$250,000 to the 2012-13 budget. Third, it is imperative that the Plainville Board of Education implement a new K-5 math program in order to be aligned with the Common Core State Standards, as required by the state for all Connecticut schools. The purchase of new math textbooks to meet these standards will require an increase of \$100,000 in the 2012-13 budget. Finally, the Board must always budget for contractual salary increases for current staff, increases to health insurance and other benefits and costs associated with tuitions for outplaced special education students and students who are attending magnet schools. Technology Today

Plainville students and staff use a variety of software. Open Source is one software type used districtwide. It is liberally licensed to allow users the right to use, copy, study, change, and improve its design through the availability of its source code. One of its applications is Open Office, an open alternative to Microsoft Office. It has many of the same components including a word processor, spreadsheet, and presentation options. Additional Open Source software utilized are Web tools, including Moodle--a free web application used to create effective online learning sites. Teachers also use Moodle to give assessments and provide an online forum. Deploy Studio is used to image and install much of the software on district computers. These Open Source tools, combined with many of the free products available, help Plainville schools keep software costs at a minimum.

What is it like being the mascot of Frank T. Wheeler School? It's a great job. I get to show up at special occasions like the Summer Reading Celebration, the Fall Festival, and my favorite, the first day of school. The kids get really rowdy, but they are always respectful.

First, administration is investigating a proposal put forth by Energy Education which, when implemented, would reduce energy costs. Second, the state has increased the reimbursement rate under the Open Choice grant program. If Plainville remains at its current rate of participation of 3%, the district could realize at least an additional \$350,000 in revenues. This would help offset the revenue lost through the sun setting of the Ed Jobs funds.

While there are many challenges to crafting an appropriate budget to meet the needs of Plainville's students, it should be pointed out that Plainville taxpayers receive a great deal of quality and value for their tax dollar. In a joint presentation to

the Town Council and Board of Education on December 13th, both the Superintendent and Town Manager provided a number of facts to support this notion. The Superintendent provided showing that Plainville is below the state average in terms of expenditure per pupil and Plainville's figure is in line with the rest of the district's reference group. He also pointed out that state standardized test scores are in the top quarter of the reference group, but average teacher and administrator's salaries are second lowest in the group compared to neighboring districts. Also, school suspension rates at the high school and middle school continue to decline dramatically even though Plainville is in the

bottom half of the reference group as measured by the number of administrators per student. On a town-wide basis, the Town Manager reported that tax increases and budget increases--both on the town and education side--have been very low over the past five years.

Overall, the Board of Education budget is expected to focus on students, teaching, and learning in all aspects of the decision making process. It will involve an open and collaborative process and will include a discussion of needed items that are not in the 2012-13 budget in the context of planning for realized savings in the current fiscal year.
